Royal Homes partners with Habitat for Humanity for a local project

Here's a write-up supplied by Habitat for Humanity Sarnia/Lambton that summarizes their experience on this build:

on this build:

Habitat for Humanity Sarnia/Lambton is a non-profit organization that builds and sells simple, decent, and

affordable homes to deserving families in Sarnia and Lambton County for a \$0-down, 0%-interest, 20-year, Habitat-held mortgage. They do not give homes away. Rather, their partner families are homeowners in every sense of the word.

Each family's geared-to-income, monthly mortgage payments are paid to Habitat who, in turn,

channels 100% of this mortgage revenue back into

building more homes. As of December 2016, Habitat has built new, or renovated and re-sold, 39 houses in Sarnia and Lambton County, providing transformational home ownership opportunities for 46 local families and giving 148 individuals a place to call 'home'.

However, Habitat Sarnia/Lambton has always struggled with the logistics and efficiency of building homes for families in rural Lambton County. In pursuit of expediting

rural builds more effectively, Habitat reached out to the team at Royal Homes. The senior leadership team at

Royal Homes were incredibly receptive to the challenge of

helping Habitat for Humanity to address this issue. While Royal Homes had previously supported their local Habitat affiliate through the provision of construction materials, they had never entertained a full partnership with Habitat. What resulted was a first-of-its kind partnership between the NPO and the Royal Homes team.

Two families in the small Village of Watford in rural

southwestern Ontario needed homes. Habitat wanted to

build two semi-detached homes for these families and Royal Homes was excited to help. The premise of the partnership was simple. Habitat would work with its volunteer teams and local suppliers to prepare the foundations for the homes. Royal Homes would build, then deliver the 'shells' of the homes, where after Habitat – and its team of dedicated volunteers – would complete the homes.

Monday, December 5th, 2016 was a very cold, sunny day in Watford. With the assistance of a 160-ton crane and


operators donated by Mammoet Canada—and lots of

interest from community members who stopped by to watch— the two homes were set on the foundations. Both homes had Tyvec'd exteriors with soffit and fascia in place, shingled roofs, windows, doors, in-wall electrical, interior drywall completed with painter's primer already in place. In the days since, volunteer teams are already hard at work getting the homes ready for the two Habitat families.

The Watford homes are part of the Jimmy & Rosalynn Carter 2017 Work Project and are also two of 150 homes that will be celebrated as part of a Habitat, Canada-wide project in celebration of our country's 150th Anniversary.
